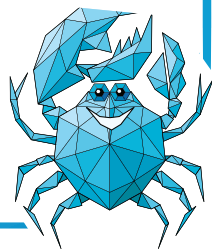

is the Director of the Office of Cancer Survivorship (OCS) in the Division of Cancer Control and Population Sciences at the National Cancer Institute. Since she assumed the position of full-time Director of the OCS in 1999, Dr. Rowland has sought to champion the visibility of and investment in cancer survivorship research, and to raise public awareness about the health and quality-of-life needs

of the growing population of cancer survivors and their families.

Dr. Rowland received her Ph.D. in Developmental Psychology from Columbia University and completed a two-year NIH-funded post-doctoral fellowship in psychosocial oncology at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center. While at MSKCC, where she held joint appointments in pediatrics and neurology, Dr. Rowland helped to develop and was the first Director of the Post-Treatment Resource Program, an innovative resource that continues to provide a full range of non-medical services to patients and their families after the end of treatment.

Her particular areas of research include cancer survivorship, adaptation to illness, sexual function post-treatment, the interface between cancer and aging, the impact of cancer-caregiving on providers and recipients of this care, and adherence to medical recommendations after cancer.

Across her career as a clinician, researcher and teacher in the area of psychosocial aspects of cancer, Dr. Rowland has worked with and conducted competitively funded research among both pediatric and adult cancer survivors and their families, and published broadly in psycho-oncology. She co-edited the groundbreaking text Handbook of Psycho-oncology, as well as the more recent Handbook of Cancer Control and Behavioral Science
